

Reformulating the Legal Obligation of Marriage Registration in Indonesia: Toward Legal Certainty and Protection

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ABSTRACT

Marriage registration in Indonesia functions as a legal instrument to ensure certainty, protection, and recognition of marital status, yet its implementation remains inconsistent due to structural, socio-cultural, and administrative challenges. This study examines the reformulation of the legal obligation of marriage registration through a socio-legal approach, integrating normative legal analysis with empirical observations to identify gaps between regulatory frameworks and societal practices. Findings indicate that limited access to services, low legal awareness, economic constraints, and strong reliance on religious validation contribute to the persistence of unregistered marriages, which in turn weaken legal protection, particularly for women and children. Institutional disparities, procedural complexity, and fragmented policies further reduce the effectiveness of the current system. Reformulation is directed toward strengthening accessibility, simplifying procedures, integrating digital systems, enhancing institutional coordination, and promoting public awareness, while maintaining alignment with socio-cultural values. The study emphasizes the importance of harmonizing legal norms with community practices and reinforcing collaboration between state institutions and religious authorities to improve compliance and legitimacy. A comprehensive and adaptive legal framework is necessary to ensure that marriage registration is both enforceable and socially accepted, ultimately supporting legal certainty, protecting fundamental rights, and fostering equitable implementation within the national legal system.

INTRODUCTION

Marriage is recognized as a fundamental social and legal institution, shaping family structures and determining rights and obligations between individuals. In Indonesia, the legal recognition of marriage carries significant implications for civil status, inheritance, and access to state services. The

obligation to register marriages has long been established as a mechanism to ensure legal certainty (Peerenboom, 2023). However, disparities between normative rules and social practices continue to create legal ambiguity. Many marriages remain unregistered, raising complex questions about protection and recognition. This condition highlights the need for a deeper examination of the legal framework governing marriage registration. A systematic reformulation becomes essential to bridge the gap between law and reality (Sieder, 2021).

Legal certainty serves as a cornerstone of modern legal systems, ensuring predictability and fairness in the application of rules. Within the Indonesian context, marriage registration is intended to provide clear evidence of marital status, yet its implementation remains inconsistent (van den Brink, 2022). The absence of proper documentation often leads to disputes over rights and responsibilities. Individuals in unregistered marriages frequently face barriers in accessing legal remedies (Kabeer, 2021). Such challenges reveal structural weaknesses in the current regulatory approach. A comprehensive legal reformulation is required to strengthen the effectiveness of registration obligations (Faundez, 2021). This effort must align with principles of justice and social protection.

The Indonesian Marriage Law establishes the requirement for marriage registration, positioning it as a formal condition for legal recognition. Despite this provision, cultural and religious practices sometimes prioritize ceremonial validity over administrative compliance. This divergence creates a dualism between religious legitimacy and state legality (Vel, 2023). As a result, many couples consider registration as secondary, reducing its perceived importance. The legal system, therefore, struggles to enforce compliance effectively. Addressing this issue demands a reformulation that integrates social values with legal mandates. Such an approach can enhance acceptance and adherence among communities (Gelb & Metz, 2021).

Unregistered marriages often lead to significant legal consequences, particularly for women and children. Without official documentation, claims related to inheritance, custody, and marital property become difficult to enforce. Vulnerable groups are disproportionately affected by these legal gaps (Sen, 2023). The absence of registration undermines their ability to obtain legal protection. This situation contradicts the broader objective of law as an instrument of social justice (Desai & Woolcock, 2022). Strengthening the obligation of registration can mitigate these risks. A restructured legal framework must prioritize the protection of fundamental rights.

Empirical observations indicate that administrative barriers contribute to low registration rates in certain regions. Limited access to civil registration services, financial constraints, and lack of awareness hinder compliance. These

factors demonstrate that the issue extends beyond legal norms (Bedner, 2022). Institutional capacity and public education play a crucial role in ensuring effective implementation. Without addressing these underlying challenges, legal reform alone may prove insufficient (Bank, 2024). A holistic approach is necessary to achieve meaningful change. Reformulation must incorporate both normative and practical considerations.

The principle of legal protection emphasizes the state's responsibility to safeguard individual rights through clear and enforceable regulations. Marriage registration functions as a preventive mechanism against legal disputes. It provides a reliable record that can be used as evidence in judicial proceedings (Young, 2024). In its absence, the burden of proof becomes significantly more complex. This condition weakens the position of affected parties in legal conflicts. Enhancing the regulatory framework can strengthen the protective function of registration. Legal reform should aim to ensure accessibility and reliability of the system (Raz, 2024).

Comparative perspectives reveal that many jurisdictions have strengthened marriage registration systems to improve legal certainty. These systems often integrate digital technologies and simplified procedures (Otto, 2022). Indonesia can draw valuable lessons from such practices while maintaining its socio-cultural context. Adapting international standards requires careful consideration of local dynamics (Zimmermann, 2021). Reformulation should not merely replicate foreign models, but rather contextualize them appropriately. This approach can enhance the effectiveness of legal reforms. A balanced strategy is essential for sustainable implementation.

The relationship between law and society plays a crucial role in determining the success of legal regulations. Normative provisions must resonate with social realities to achieve compliance (Abebe, 2021). In the case of marriage registration, public perception significantly influences behavior. If the obligation is perceived as burdensome or unnecessary, compliance rates remain low. Legal reform must therefore address not only the content of the law but also its social acceptance (Griffiths, 2023). Public engagement and awareness campaigns are key components of this process. Strengthening trust in legal institutions can improve adherence.

Religious considerations hold a prominent place in Indonesian society, influencing attitudes toward marriage. Many communities prioritize religious validation over administrative procedures. This perspective contributes to the persistence of unregistered marriages (Bennet, 2023). Legal reform must navigate this sensitive intersection between religion and state authority. Harmonization between religious principles and legal requirements is essential. A well-designed framework can accommodate both dimensions without undermining legal

certainty (Dixon & Landau, 2022). Such integration can foster greater compliance and legitimacy.

The current regulatory framework reflects an attempt to balance legal formalities with social values. However, gaps in enforcement and coordination among institutions reduce its effectiveness. Fragmentation of responsibilities creates inefficiencies in the registration process (Sandefur, 2022). Strengthening institutional collaboration is crucial for improving outcomes. Clear guidelines and streamlined procedures can enhance consistency (Deininger, 2023). Reformulation should address these structural issues comprehensively. Institutional reform is a key component of legal transformation.

Access to justice is closely linked to the availability of legal documentation. Individuals without registered marriages often encounter difficulties in asserting their rights. This limitation extends to various aspects of life, including access to education and healthcare for children (Trebilcock, 2023). Legal invisibility becomes a significant barrier to social inclusion. Addressing this issue requires a proactive legal approach. Strengthening registration obligations can promote inclusivity and equality (Simeon, 2022). Legal reform must prioritize accessibility and fairness.

The concept of legal reformulation involves revisiting existing norms to enhance their relevance and effectiveness. In the context of marriage registration, this process requires a critical evaluation of current laws. Identifying weaknesses and inconsistencies is a necessary step toward improvement (Trubek, 2024). Reformulation should aim to create a coherent and integrated legal framework. This approach can reduce ambiguity and improve enforcement. Socio-economic factors also influence compliance with registration obligations. Financial constraints may discourage individuals from completing administrative procedures. In some cases, informal practices are perceived as more accessible and cost-effective. Addressing these barriers requires policy interventions that reduce costs and simplify processes (Hellum, 2022). Providing incentives or subsidies can encourage compliance. Legal reform should

Public awareness plays a critical role in promoting compliance with legal obligations. Many individuals lack understanding of the importance of marriage registration (Rose-Ackerman, 2022). Educational initiatives can help bridge this knowledge gap. Informing communities about the legal consequences of unregistered marriages is essential. Awareness campaigns can enhance public perception of the law (Corbacho & Rivas, 2021). Strengthening communication strategies is a key component of reform. Effective outreach can improve compliance and legal literacy.

The role of local authorities is crucial in implementing registration policies. Decentralized governance structures influence the effectiveness of legal enforcement. Variations in administrative capacity can lead to unequal outcomes across regions. Strengthening local institutions is necessary to ensure consistent implementation. Ensuring equal access to legal recognition is a key objective of modern legal systems. Unregistered marriages can undermine these rights. Strengthening the obligation of registration aligns with international human rights standards. Legal reform should reflect these principles. Protecting individual dignity remains a central concern.

Policy integration is necessary to address the multifaceted nature of marriage registration. Legal reform must be supported by administrative, social, and economic measures. Coordination among various sectors can enhance effectiveness. A fragmented approach is unlikely to produce sustainable results. Integrating policies can create a comprehensive framework. The reformulation of marriage registration obligations represents a critical step toward strengthening legal certainty in Indonesia. Addressing existing gaps

requires a systematic and evidence-based approach. Combining normative analysis with empirical insights can provide a solid foundation for reform. The integration of legal principles, social values, and institutional capacity is essential. A balanced and inclusive framework can enhance compliance and protection. This study aims to contribute to the development of such a framework. Achieving legal certainty and protection remains the ultimate objective.

RESEARCH METHODS

The research method in this article is designed to provide a systematic, empirical, and analytical framework for examining the reformulation of the legal obligation of marriage registration in Indonesia (Freeman, 2020). The study adopts a socio-legal research design, combining normative legal analysis with empirical observations. This approach enables a comprehensive understanding of both the legal framework and its practical implementation. The integration of doctrinal and field-based analysis strengthens the relevance of the findings (van Klink & Taekema, 2023). A structured methodology ensures logical consistency throughout the research process. The design aligns with established legal research theories. The research design applies a qualitative method with an analytical-descriptive approach. This method is chosen to explore legal norms and their application in real social settings. Qualitative analysis allows for an in-depth understanding of legal phenomena related to marriage registration (Webley, 2017). The descriptive aspect aims to systematically present facts and conditions found during the study. Analytical processes are used to interpret legal provisions and empirical data (McCrudden, 2020). This design ensures that the research remains focused and coherent. The chosen approach supports the development of a reformulation model.

The normative component of the research focuses on statutory regulations governing marriage registration. Primary legal materials include laws, government regulations, and official legal documents. Secondary materials consist of legal doctrines, academic journals, and expert opinions. The analysis examines the consistency and adequacy of existing regulations (Hutchinson, 2022). This step identifies gaps and inconsistencies within the legal framework. A systematic review of legal texts provides a strong theoretical foundation. The normative approach ensures alignment with established legal principles (Finch & Fafinski, 2022).

The empirical component complements the normative analysis by examining real-world practices. Field observations are conducted to understand how marriage registration is implemented. This includes identifying barriers and challenges faced by communities. Empirical data provide insights into the

effectiveness of legal norms (Watkins & Burton, 2019). The combination of normative and empirical data enhances the validity of the research. This dual approach allows for a more comprehensive evaluation. The findings contribute to a more grounded legal reformulation (Del Mar, 2023).

Research subjects in this study include individuals and institutions directly involved in marriage registration processes. Key participants consist of married couples, religious officials, and civil registration officers. Legal practitioners and academics are also included to provide expert perspectives (Siems, 2019). The selection of subjects is based on their relevance to the research topic. This ensures that the data collected reflects diverse viewpoints. Questions focus on challenges, perceptions, and compliance related to marriage registration. The flexibility of open-ended questions supports in-depth analysis. Data obtained from interviews contribute to understanding social and legal dynamics. This method enhances the richness of the findings. The instrument supports qualitative analysis.

Observation instruments are used to capture real conditions in registration processes. Field observations focus on administrative procedures and public interactions. This method provides direct insight into how policies are implemented. Observational data complement information obtained from interviews. Consistency in observation is maintained through structured

checklists. This ensures reliability of the data collected. Observation strengthens empirical findings.

Data collection techniques include literature review, interviews, and field observations. Literature review focuses on gathering relevant legal and academic sources. Interviews are conducted with selected participants using prepared guidelines. Field observations are carried out in relevant institutions. The combination of these techniques ensures comprehensive data collection. Each method contributes unique insights to the research. Triangulation is applied to enhance data validity.

The literature review process involves systematic identification and analysis of legal materials. Sources include legislation, court decisions, and scholarly publications. This process helps establish a theoretical framework for the study. Critical analysis is used to identify strengths and weaknesses in existing laws. Interview data are collected through direct interaction with participants. Interviews are conducted in a structured yet flexible manner. Responses are recorded and documented for analysis. Ethical considerations, including informed consent, are strictly observed. This ensures the integrity of the research process. Interview data provide valuable qualitative insights. Data analysis techniques apply qualitative methods to interpret collected data. Normative data are analyzed through legal interpretation and systematic comparison. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

A significant gap persists between the legal framework governing marriage registration and its practical implementation across Indonesia, where formal obligations coexist with strong social reliance on religious validation. Legal provisions clearly position registration as a requirement for recognition, yet compliance remains uneven and often situational (Cammack, 2022). This duality produces a condition in which marriages are socially acknowledged but lack formal legal standing. Such circumstances weaken the function of law as a guarantor of certainty. Normative expectations fail to translate into consistent behavior. A reorientation of regulatory structure becomes necessary to close this divide (Edwards, 2022).

Patterns of unregistered marriages are more visible in rural and geographically isolated regions, where access to administrative services remains limited. Physical distance, transportation constraints, and uneven infrastructure reduce interaction with civil registration offices (Goodwin, 2022). Informal mechanisms become more attractive due to simplicity and accessibility. Administrative absence indirectly reinforces non-compliance. Structural inequality in service distribution continues to shape legal behavior. Expanding access to registration services is essential for strengthening implementation (Ni'ami et al., 2025). Equal service provision supports a more inclusive legal system.

Economic considerations also influence decisions related to marriage registration, where perceived costs create hesitation among certain groups. Even minimal administrative fees may be interpreted as burdensome when compared to informal alternatives (von Benda-Beckmann, 2023). Prioritization of immediate financial needs often overrides legal formalities. Informal arrangements appear more efficient and practical. This perception reduces the perceived urgency of registration. Legal obligations require alignment with economic realities (Fauzi, 2022). Policy adjustments addressing affordability can improve participation.

Public awareness regarding the legal importance of marriage registration remains uneven, particularly in communities with limited exposure to formal legal education. Many individuals are unfamiliar with long-term consequences associated with unregistered marital status (Fasa, 2021). Knowledge gaps contribute to the normalization of informal practices. Legal literacy becomes a determining factor in compliance. Without sufficient understanding, obligations are easily disregarded. Expanding educational outreach is crucial for shaping behavior. Awareness strengthens the connection between law and society (S. Wahyuni, 2022).

Administrative procedures are frequently perceived as complex, creating additional barriers to compliance. Lengthy processes and unclear requirements discourage individuals from engaging with registration systems. Institutional

inefficiencies reduce confidence in formal mechanisms (Jazuli, 2021). Delays in processing further diminish motivation. Simplification of procedures can significantly improve public response. Efficient systems promote accessibility and trust. Administrative reform is therefore a critical component of legal effectiveness (N. Azizah, 2023).

Institutional capacity varies considerably across regions, influencing the quality and consistency of service delivery. Some local offices operate with adequate resources and trained personnel, while others face significant limitations. Shortages in staffing and infrastructure reduce operational efficiency (Hidayatullah, 2023). Inconsistent service quality contributes to unequal legal outcomes. Strengthening institutional capacity is essential for uniform implementation (Arifin, 2023). Resource allocation must reflect regional needs. Balanced development enhances system reliability.

Religious authority continues to shape perceptions of marital legitimacy, often taking precedence over administrative requirements. Community reliance on religious leaders reinforces the belief that ceremonial validation is sufficient. This dynamic reduces the perceived necessity of formal registration (Riyanto, 2023). Legal obligations must therefore engage with existing social structures. Collaboration between religious institutions and state authorities can improve acceptance. Integrative approaches enhance legitimacy (Nurjanah, 2021). Harmonization fosters stronger compliance.

Legal dualism between religious recognition and state legality creates ambiguity in the interpretation of marital status. Individuals may consider themselves legitimately married despite lacking formal documentation. This condition complicates legal enforcement and dispute resolution. The coexistence of parallel systems weakens the authority of statutory law (Purba, 2025). Clarification of legal standards is necessary to reduce ambiguity. Alignment between systems strengthens coherence. Legal certainty depends on unified interpretation (Nugraha, 2023).

Women and children face disproportionate risks in situations involving unregistered marriages, particularly in matters related to inheritance, custody, and property rights. Absence of documentation limits their legal standing in disputes. Vulnerability increases when legal protection is required (Nugroho, 2022). Informal arrangements fail to provide sufficient safeguards. Strengthening registration obligations supports protection of fundamental rights. Legal reform must prioritize vulnerable groups. Equity remains central to effective regulation (Hartono, 2023).

Children born within unregistered unions often encounter administrative challenges in obtaining legal identity, affecting access to essential services such as education and healthcare. Documentation gaps create long-term disadvantages.

Legal invisibility restricts participation in broader social systems (Shahriyani, 2022). Civil registration becomes a gateway to fundamental rights. Strengthening marriage registration contributes to improved identity systems. Integrated policies enhance administrative coherence. Legal recognition supports social inclusion (Kurniawan, 2022).

Judicial handling of disputes related to unregistered marriages reveals inconsistencies in interpretation, reflecting ambiguity within existing legal provisions. Courts often rely on contextual considerations, including religious validation, when making decisions (Huda, 2021). Variability in judicial reasoning reduces predictability. Clear legislative guidance can support consistency. Harmonization between statutory law and judicial practice is essential (Amalia, 2022). Stronger legal clarity improves adjudication. Consistency reinforces public confidence.

Comparative practices demonstrate that simplified and accessible registration systems contribute to higher compliance levels. Streamlined procedures reduce administrative burden and encourage participation (Hidayat, 2022). Digital platforms have proven effective in enhancing accessibility. Adaptation of such approaches requires sensitivity to local conditions. Reform strategies should incorporate practical innovations (Fitri, 2023). Contextual application ensures sustainability. Lessons from other systems provide valuable insight.

Technological integration presents opportunities to modernize registration processes through digital platforms that increase efficiency and accessibility. Online services reduce physical barriers and processing time (Savitri, 2021). However, uneven digital literacy and infrastructure must be addressed. Inclusive implementation is essential to avoid new inequalities. Technology should complement, not replace, traditional systems. Balanced integration enhances effectiveness. Innovation supports administrative transformation (Hamzah, 2021).

Public trust in legal institutions plays a significant role in shaping compliance behavior, where negative perceptions of bureaucracy discourage engagement (Wijaya, 2022). Transparency and accountability influence institutional credibility. Efficient service delivery can rebuild confidence. Trust encourages voluntary compliance. Strengthening institutional integrity becomes a priority. Legal reform must address perception as well as structure. Confidence in systems enhances participation (Suryani, 2022).

Community-based approaches offer effective strategies for increasing awareness and encouraging registration, particularly through engagement with local leaders and organizations (Kartika, 2023). Social influence shapes individual decisions. Tailored communication strategies are more impactful than generalized campaigns. Cultural sensitivity enhances acceptance. Collaboration with

community actors strengthens outreach efforts (Ridwan, 2023). Local engagement supports sustainable change. Participation fosters collective responsibility.

Fragmentation within regulatory frameworks contributes to confusion among both administrators and the public, where overlapping rules create inconsistencies in implementation (Riyanto, 2024). Lack of coordination reduces clarity. Simplification and integration of policies can improve effectiveness. Coherent frameworks support easier compliance. Streamlined regulations enhance administrative efficiency. Policy alignment is essential for reform. Consistency strengthens legal authority (Saputra, 2024).

Socio-cultural norms continue to influence attitudes toward marriage registration, where traditional practices emphasize communal recognition over formal legality (Pratiwi, 2024). Deeply rooted customs shape decision-making processes. Legal reform must engage with these cultural realities. Imposing rigid frameworks may lead to resistance. Adaptive strategies enhance acceptance. Cultural alignment supports compliance. Social integration strengthens legal effectiveness (Kartika, 2024).

Gender dynamics affect access to registration processes, where women may face barriers due to social and economic constraints. Limited autonomy restricts participation in administrative procedures (Suryani, 2025). Empowerment initiatives can improve access. Equal participation strengthens legal protection. Gender-sensitive policies enhance inclusivity (Wijaya, 2025). Addressing inequality supports reform objectives. Equity improves system outcomes.

Incentive-based approaches can encourage compliance by providing tangible benefits for registered marriages, such as access to services or administrative advantages. Positive reinforcement complements regulatory measures. Incentives increase motivation to comply (Nugraha, 2024). Careful
